PAVILION COMMISSION

Since 2000, Serpentine has commissioned internationally renowned and emerging architects to create their first completed structure in England. The aim of the Pavilion commission is to select architects who consistently extend the boundaries of contemporary architectural practice and to introduce these practitioners to wider audiences. We invite the architects to design a Pavilion that can be used as a meeting space and café by day and a forum for learning, debate and entertainment at night. This year's selection was made by Bettina Korek, CEO; Hans Ulrich Obrist, Artistic Director; Julie Burnell, Director of Construction and Special Projects; Chris Bayley, Exhibitions Curator; Natalia Grabowska, Curator at Large and Site-specific Projects; and Alexa Chow, Assistant Exhibitions Curator, together with advisors Sou Fujimoto and David Glover.

The inaugural Pavilion was designed by Dame Zaha Hadid, who conceived the commissioning programme with former Serpentine Director Dame Julia Peyton-Jones in 2000. SERPENTINE PAVILION 2025 A CAPSULE IN TIME

Designed by Marina Tabassum Architects

Celebrated for establishing an architectural language that is both contemporary and deeply connected to a specific place, climate, context, culture and history, Marina Tabassum and her Dhakabased firm have completed a wide range of architectural projects that are socially, politically and ecologically engaged. Their work, grounded in deep research and close collaboration with communities they serve, spans housing, community centres and refugee camps to mosques and museums. Beyond her built work in the city of Dhaka and across Bangladesh, Tabassum's studio also leads research into environmental degradation in Bangladesh – a country confronting the direct impacts of climate change.

For centuries, architects have grappled with the relationship between architecture and time. Titled *A Capsule in Time*, the Pavilion reflects on this enduring theme, evoking a meaningful dialogue between the permanent and ephemeral nature of the Serpentine Pavilion commission. The structure draws inspiration from the dynamic Bengal Delta – a vast terrain located in the Indian subcontinent where land and water are in constant flux. In this region, architecture is also ephemeral or adaptable to the extremities of weather. The Pavilion, populated by visitors over five months before disassembled, mirrors this impermanence. Once no longer sited on Serpentine South's lawn, it continues to exist in the virtual realm and the collective memory of those who experienced it. In Tabassum's words, 'architecture becomes memories of lived spaces'.

Positioned along the north-south axis of the park, *A Capsule in Time* features an elongated capsule-like form with a central court

that aligns with Serpentine South's bell tower. Inspired by summer park-going and arched garden canopies of Kensington Gardens that filter soft daylight through green foliage, the structure is comprised of four wooden sculptural forms with a translucent façade that diffuses and dapples light as it enters the space. A kinetic element allows one capsule form to move, transforming the space into a new configuration.

Emphasising the sensory and spiritual possibilities of architecture through scale, materiality and the interplay of light and shadow, Tabassum's design draws on the history and architectural tradition of Shamiyana tents or awnings of South Asia. Similarly kinetic in their function, these structures are made of fabric supported by bamboo poles and are commonly erected for outdoor gatherings and celebrations. The architect's first structure built entirely from wood, the Pavilion is designed around a semi-mature Ginkgo tree, bringing the park inside with great sensitivity and poetics. Its openness invites visitors to gather, converse and engage with a dynamic programme of events.

In an era defined by information overload and growing censorship, Tabassum envisions the Pavilion as a shared, versatile space for connection, learning, dialogue and knowledge exchange. Within, visitors can browse a collection of books celebrating Bengali literature, poetry, ecology, politics and culture, selected by Tabassum and her studio. Once dismantled, the Pavilion's afterlife is imagined as a library.

CATALOGUE

To accompany the Serpentine Pavilion 2025, Serpentine and Verlag der Buchhandlung Walther und Franz König, Köln, will publish a catalogue on Marina Tabassum, available from July 2025. Designed by Wolfe Hall, it brings together new and insightful contributions from Shumon Basar; Rana Begum; Deborah Berke; Perween Hasan; Naeem Mohaiemen; and Thomas de Monchaux. Alongside these contributions, it features drawings from Tabassum's sketchbook; a photo essay by Iwan Baan; a conversation with David Chipperfield; and an in-depth interview with Hans Ulrich Obrist.
